SPRING BAY MILL

Ancient middens at Freestone Point serve as a reminder that the land of the paredarerme people upon which Spring Bay Mill sits at trayapana/Triabunna on the east coast of lutruwita/Tasmania, has long been a place for groups to gather, feast and share culture. The middens serve as stark contrast of the land's more recent visual history that tells the story of the industrialisation of this site, which was once extraordinarily, home to the world's largest woodchip mill.

he acquisition of the Mill by current custodian, Wotif.com founder and digital entrepreneur, philanthropist and environmentalist Graham Wood AM, essentially ended logging in southern Tasmania, making way for the regeneration of this once destructive site which has since undergone an astounding metamorphosis in this latest iteration of its long and varied story.

Wood and his team have up-cycled the industrial past into stunning, award-winning event spaces and rejuvenated the natural landscape with forests, grasslands, designed plantings and organic produce gardens, culminating in 43 hectares of inspiring stories.

A place with purpose allowing guests to craft a unique, environmentally sustainable event packed with enriching experiences, architecturally designed high-end business facilities and versatile event



spaces are surrounded by a tranquil natural setting to motivate and inspire.

Two large indoor spaces offer flexible options for stand up or sit down meetings, presentations, performances and dining. The Tin Shed with a capacity of 250, is a large rustic hall with staging, lighting and a deck with water views and an outdoor cooking area. The Banksia Room has a capacity of 300, with panoramic views across the bay, and features an adjoining commercial kitchen, full bar facilities and outdoor sandstone courtyard with firepit.


Outdoor gathering spaces include the Windlass Deck with a mesmerising sea view backdrop and the unique Amphitheatre with seating in the round for 250 and a grass hill for larger performance events.

With a culinary offering as equally as impressive, from spit-roast BBQs to fine-dining tasting menus, Spring Bay Mill's in-house chef creates meals inspired by the best of seasonal Tasmanian ingredients and

fresh heirloom produce grown organically onsite by the Mill's horticulture team, treating visitors to a home grown garden to plate experience. Tasmania's east coast is a revered viticulture region and Spring Bay Mill works with the best Tasmanian suppliers of wine, beer, sprits and non-alcoholic beverages to complement each menu.

A diverse array of accommodation options are peppered across the site. The Ridge Quarters encapsulates 13 ensuite rooms with shared kitchen, dining and lounging spaces to give privacy with plenty of opportunity to gather and collaborate. Four Beach Shacks provide comfort, sea views and outdoor hot-tubs in stylish and secluded offgrid accommodation. For the more adventurous, the 32tent Glamping Field brings guests close to nature without compromising any creature comforts with twin, queen or king beds, fully equipped camp kitchen and fire-pit and hangout area.

Not just a venue for hire, but a place rich in history and experiences, guests are invited to plan a bespoke itinerary for their event prior to arrival, with tree planting, stargazing, historical walks, horticultural workshops and Indigenous Cultural events all available to be enjoyed on site. Private boat trips to wukaluwikiwayna / Maria Island National Park, marine reserve and home of the UNESCO World Heritage listed Darlington **Probation Station convict** site, can also be arranged.



At Spring Bay Mill, they practice ecological regeneration and promote sustainable living. With values of treading lightly on our earth always front of mind, the team at the Mill embody the ethos that big impact events shouldn't mean a big impact on the environment. Producing events to the highest possible ecological and socially responsible standards, every decision they make from the design of the site to the products they buy and people they work with is based on the best possible environmental, social and cultural outcomes in mind.

CONFERENCE WITH US

Not so very long ago,
Tasmania was viewed by
the rest of the world as
that tiny little island at
the bottom of the map,
known primarily for apple
production (earning us
the moniker The Apple
Isle) and the Tasmanian
Devil (although usually
the cartoon version as
opposed to the world's
largest surviving
carnivorous marsupial
version).

ack then, most of us fortunate enough to live here had at least one story of bumping into a tourist on their travels who had flown in and hired a car thinking they could drive around the entire island in just one day before flying back to Melbourne or Sydney the next morning (technically, maybe you could, but you would be doing yourself an incredible injustice in the process).

Then in the early 2000s, the phenomenon that is Mona came along, putting us fairly and squarely on the map. All eyes were on Tasmania and the rest of the world finally

caught up and caught on to what we Tasmanians had been unassumingly revelling in for years... the world's cleanest air, pristine stretches of coastline, crisp and cool rugged alpine ranges, an abundance of fresh local produce and some of the best Pinot and Whisky in the world!

Suddenly, being the tiny island at the bottom of the map was in vogue and everyone wanted in. With the spotlight firmly on us, people started looking beyond the old cliches, seeking to experience Tasmania's own brand of the unique and the bespoke off the beaten track.

Whilst we will always deal in the boutique and the intimate, Tasmania can and does offer the best of both worlds when it comes to business events, frequently hosting association conferences and events of scale in our major city centres in both the north and south.

Hobart is home to two of our largest conference and plenary spaces in Hotel **Grand Chancellor Hobart** and Wrest Point Hotel & Conference Centre. With myriad options available for off site dinners and functions, event organisers can choose to host cocktail parties at nearby vineyards in the Coal Valley just 15 minutes from the CBD, or opt for something more central in one of Hobart's many beautiful historical buildings.

The city can comfortably cater for association events up to 1100 pax, and regularly does. Hobart's first major conference since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic was The Royal Australian & New Zealand College of Psychiatrists Congress held back in May 2021. 850 delegates converged on Hobart for the five day event held at Hotel Grand Chancellor overlooking the waterfront. More recently the Society for Mental Health Research hosted its Annual Conference at the same venue for 300 delegates. Both events were managed by WALDRONSMITH Management and Managing Director Kate Smith says Hobart really hits the mark for conferences - large and small.

"Hobart is an ideal location – a city that offers capacity and



infrastructure and a passionate team of event professionals to help deliver outstanding events. The stunning harbourside location is a great base for delegates to explore the city and its surrounds and enjoy a truly unique immersive Tasmanian experience."


The other key reason Tasmania is such an obvious choice for the association market is because despite our small island status, we are big on innovation. As the gateway to the Antarctic we are home to world leading researchers and oceanographers, and Tasmania has also reached net zero emissions status powered entirely by renewables thanks to our hydro electric and wind schemes.

Fertile volcanic soil and high rainfall has ensured the north of

the state is a food bowl and hub for innovation in agriculture, and the state is well versed in medical research, viticulture, aquaculture and sustainable forestry practices.

With University of
Tasmania campuses in our
three major metropolitan
regions, Tassie boasts a
hive of local talent and
industry experts when
considering key note
speakers from the host
destination.

For Andi Lucas, Executive Officer of Tasmanian Hemp Association and Event Manager for the Australian Industrial Hemp Conference, bringing the third biennial to Launceston for 2022 allowed the executive to leverage



Tasmania's status as an industry leader, that has produced the vast majority of hemp grown in Australia over the past seven seasons.

"For me personally it was so exciting to bring the Australian Industrial Hemp Conference to Launceston to gather world leading experts from around the globe in a state where hemp production is such a big industry, and it was wonderful to include so many local stories in the program."

Ms Lucas says another significant benefit of conferencing in Tasmania is the


close proximity of conference facilities to regional site visits.

"I have seen firsthand delegates amazed by the fact that they can be sitting in a plenary session in Launceston, and then within half an hour, be on site participating in a site visit and learning about local innovation in the region in real time. This is a huge bonus to conferencing in Tasmania over a larger mainland city."

For the association market, Tasmania offers the capacity, facilities and conveniences of a larger city, with the charm and experience of a small town. Both Launceston and Hobart are vibrant communities rich in history and culture with a thriving foodie scene. Delegates to these places are able to meander on foot and experience the best these cities have to offer within walking distance of conferencing facilities.

As an island with a long history of punching well above its weight, the business events sector in Tasmania is no exception, as more and more savvy event organisers are discovering as our industry recovers from the disruption of the last two years.

he World Heritage listed Cascades Female Factory tells the story of the dispossession, mistreatment and forced migration of Australian convict women and girls, and their contribution to colonisation throughout the history of colonial Australia to present day. The most significant site associated with female convicts in Australia, life at Cascades was gruelling. Women were placed into three distinct classes that were according to Governor Arthur "on no account be suffered to communicate with each other". With November to March seeing unrelenting hours of labour, the shorter days in winter were the only solace for these women who toiled from dawn to dusk. The opening of a new \$5M history and Interpretation Centre in March provides purpose-built visitor facilities including an interpretation gallery, research room and multi-purpose space, making this a unique venue for meetings or offsite factions just minutes from Hobart's CBD. www.femalefactory.org.au



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EAT WITH US

Just 30 minutes south of Hobart lies the picturesque Huon Valley, a once thriving apple growing region that used to export apples right across the world, earning Tasmania the moniker of the 'Apple Isle'. In 1888 Willie Smith planted the first apple tree in the family's orchard and for four generations since, the Smith family have tended 115 acres of farmland here. Through the thick and thin of industry and surviving a crisis or two, theirs is a quintessentially Tasmanian story of pioneers, determination of spirit and most of all, family.



s a result of the innovation of current orchardist Andrew Smith, the family made the decision to go organic in 1997. As they themselves say, it was a bold move and involved a lot of new techniques and training to achieve. With this new focus on organic farming and the use of the

apples in Willie Smith cider, the family aimed to bring back the glory of the 'Apple Isle' days once more, an ethos they now share with guests through the establishment of their restaurant and function space, Willie Smith's Apple Shed.



A visit to Willie Smith's Apple Shed offers an insight into those halcyon days when trucks brimming with apples from the Huon lined up at Hobart's wharf to load apple ships. An old rustic barn surrounded by lush green pastures and wooden outbuildings, the circa 1943 apple packing shed has been sensitively renovated by award winning architects Cumulus Studio (the same architects behind Tassie icons including Pumphouse Point, Devil's Corner Cellar Door and Cradle Mountain Visitor Centre), into a unique offsite venue with flexible spaces.

The Apple Shed is a place to learn about the apple growing history of the Huon Valley, with fresh seasonal produce and wine, craft beer, and of course, Willie Smith's award-winning ciders served in a warm, heritage setting. It is also home to Charles Oates Distilling, where fine apple spirits are distilled in a hand beaten copper still. Named Antoinette and made in Tasmania, this copper alembic Charentais still is based on a 16th century Cognac still from France and is the only one of its kind in Australia!

The menu is a local affair, changing with the seasons and showcasing some of the best produce the region has to offer, and always with a hint of apple or cider shining through. No visit to Willie Smith's would be complete without indulging in the Apple Shed's Famous Apple Pie served with Van Diemen's Vanilla Bean ice cream memories of caramelised chunks of delicious organic apple wedged between the perfect pastry stay with the diner well after the final crumb has left the plate!



For conferencing, delegates can enjoy exclusive use of the Apple Shed and grounds by day or night. The Museum and Distillery are perfect spaces for breakout sessions or smaller group events and board meetings and delegates are welcome to browse the apple museum, enjoy a cider tasting and then feast on local, seasonal dishes at the end of the program.

Intimate dinner parties for 20, whole shed seated dinners for 140 or cocktail functions for 200 are easily accommodated, and the adjacent Apple Shed Paddock can cater for up to 600 guests in a festival style format.



For events in a character filled venue laden with stories, with mountain ranges in the distance, fresh clean air all around, a delicious local food and beverage offering and warm and welcoming country style hospitality, Willie Smith's Apple Shed is the perfect location.

NORTHERN TREASURE

Proud trawlwoolway man Greg Murray of kooparoona niara tours guided guests around Launceston's QVMAG exhibition, First Tasmanians: our story, an immersive encounter with the deep history and continuing culture of Tasmania's Aboriginal people. Created in consultation with the Aboriginal community, it includes rarely seen original objects and Tasmanian Aboriginal perspectives on climate change, astronomy, stories of creation, craft,

technology and architecture. Greg can also be found sharing stories of culture and country along the kooparoona niara Cultural Trail, its name meaning "mountains of the spirits" in language, the Aboriginal term for the Great Western Tiers, the mountain range that form the ancient backdrop to everyday life in this part of the state.

In contrast, a visit to World Heritage Listed Colonial farm village Brickendon Estate at Longford, just twenty minutes south of Hobart offered famil attendees insight into Tasmania's more recent history. With tranquil gardens and a host of unique event spaces weaved throughout the grounds, current owner Louise Archer provided guests with a personal tour of her estate before dinner and drinks were served in the circa 1836 timber barn that was once the workplace of local convicts repenting their crimes under harsh conditions in colonial Van Diemen's Land.

EAST COAST TREASURE

On Tasmania's iconic East Coast, lunch was held at Craigie Knowe, home to the oldest vineyard on this coastline, prepared by former Masterchef contestant turned celebrity chef Ben Milbourne with fresh seasonal local produce that was so fresh, seasonal and local that he foraged for some of it along the back roads on his journey to the cellar door! Paired of course with a selection of Craigie Knowe's finest (except for the



bubbles which are procured from 'the neighbours' at Spring Vale Vineyard next door!), guests enjoyed a long table lunch with Craigie Knowe owners, father and son duo Glen and Alex Travers who regaled the property's history.

Craigie Knowe's vines were first planted in 1979 by then Hobart dentist John Austwick, who was a pioneer of the time, establishing the vineyard despite all the local farmers thinking he was crazy! However, they soon realised John was onto something and planted their own vines, making the East



Coast the renowned cool climate wine region it is today with more than two dozen award winning vineyards scattered up and down the coast. A range of tours and experiences are available at Craigie Knowe's cellar door, with the option to bring in your own chef for larger events.

Nestled on the banks of the Swan River in the tiny coastal hamlet of Dolphin Sands, sits Melshell Oysters. The Melrose family have been farming premium oysters in the pristine waters of the Swan River and Great Oyster Bay since 1984 and have recently added to their offering with 'The Oyster Shack' — a highly instagrammable retro caravan adjacent to the oyster farm's processing shed. Guests had

the opportunity to participate in a shucking lesson... or let the Melshell team do the hard work for them while they sipped on a glass of East Coast sparkling and took in the panoramic views and fresh sea air of Great Oyster Bay! Melshell Oysters welcome the opportunity to host guests on farm and can offer bespoke experiences upon request.

SOUTHERN TREASURE

Heading south, famil attendees had the opportunity to get creative... and a little bit messy! Glazed and Confused pottery studio is located in the heart of Hobart and invites guests to unleash their creative side and gather together for a guided ceramic workshop to make

their very own decorative and functional masterpiece. Private events can be fully tailored either in the studio or offsite locations to suit client needs, and guests leave the workshop with their very own creation as a memento of their time in Tasmania.

Taking centre stage (quite literally) for lunch at the historical Theatre Royal, famil attendees were treated to a performance by Archipelago Productions, before the curtain was raised on a delectable long table feast on stage catered for and styled by renown Hobart event extraordinaire Bernadette Woods and her team at BW Events.



A popular favourite for guests to the south of the state and highlight for our famil attendees is Hobart Yachts skippered by Mark and Marsha Stranger. Available for corporate hire, Helsal IV and sister ship Magic Miles can be chartered for a range of nautical experiences from a casual afternoon sail around the River Derwent home of the Sydney to Hobart finish line, to more adventurous experiences further afield. Sharing tall tales of the convicts of Van Diemen's Land, corrupt colonial officials, whalers and sailors, guests weave their way through Hobart's character filled streets taking in local landmarks of an era gone by.

Below Lisa shares some of her Tasmanian favourites:

I LOVE LIVING IN TASMANIA BECAUSE...

We are so lucky in Tasmania! We can travel in any direction and have a completely different experience. We can head to the beautiful East Coast for sunshine and beaches, or the rugged West Coast for rivers and mountains. If you wanted to you could spend time in the snow and at the beach all in the same day! I love that there is always somewhere new to see and explore, no matter how long you have lived here.



THE BEST PART ABOUT MY JOB AS OWNER AND TOUR GUIDE FOR HOBART WALKING TOURS IS...

The people! Every tour offers a change – I have taken the same tour countless times and every single time it is always a different experience because of the people I get to meet along the way. I'm so lucky that my guests are always a diverse range of people who are all interested in learning our history. They all walk our city in the same way but come to me with different questions, making each tour a unique experience.

Being able to have our beautiful city and its heritage buildings as my office is a huge bonus as well!

AN UNMISSABLE EXPERIENCE I ALWAYS RECOMMEND WHEN VISITING OUR ISLAND STATE...

Tasmania has an incredible amount of places and experiences that truly should not be missed — almost too many to pick from, in fact! I always recommend visitors hire a car and travel to the far corners of our state for a truly Tasmanian experience. However, one of these that



definitely shouldn't be missed is the Floating Sauna at Derby. It is the perfect experience surrounded by fog, warm one minute and then swimming in the freezing water the next!

ONE THING THAT MIGHT SURPRISE PEOPLE TO LEARN ABOUT TASMANIA IS...

Colonial Hobart was a city that through its early years had endless issues with alcohol consumption — many workplaces even allowed their workers to bring pots of gin to work to consume during their lunch break!

This unsurprisingly led to fights, drowning, accidents and even more sinister calculated crimes that were taking place largely due to excessive alcohol consumption.

The Temperance League decided that things must change in the city and consequently established a number of 'Coffee Palaces' in Hobart, where the lower classes were encouraged to stop drinking alcohol, take up coffee instead, and receive counsel from well meaning patrons from the upper-class about how to change their ways. I am sure you can imagine how successful that was...



YOU HAVEN'T REALLY EXPERIENCED TASMANIA UNTIL YOU HAVE...

There are so many experiences that are truly Tasmanian, however I think one experience that is hard to beat is having to side step off a boardwalk or track whilst hiking at Maria Island or Cradle Mountain to let one of our wombats continue their way to find their lunch! Even better after some snow fall is seeing a little snow covered wombat marching their way straight to you!

MY FAVOURITE TASMANIAN:

COFFEE SPOT

Daci & Daci, love the location across form Hobart's Historic Parliament house, the friendly staff and of course the coffee!
